## Fort Saskatchewan Station Declared Historic

At 103 years of age, Fort Saskatchewan's Canadian Northern Railway Station has officially been declared a provincial historic resource, according to a provincial news release just before Christmas. Last March, city council gave its blessing to Tourism, Parks, Recreation and Culture to designate the station as a historic resource. According to the Heritage Resources Management Information System's website, the Canadian Northern Railway station is the only existing example in Alberta of a railway station built according to the railway company's 100-19 plan—a standard station plan first introduced in 1904. The stations were considered "special stations" placed only at significant points on the line. The Fort's CN Station is now home to the Fort Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce.

Other sites declared historic resources at the same time as the local CN station include the Alberta Wheat Pool Grain Elevator and the CP railway station in Paradise Valley, Strathcona Collegiate Institute in Edmonton, the Alberta Wheat Pool Grain Elevator and Bow Slope Stockyard in Scandia, the Isolation Hospital in Lethbridge, the St. Ambrose Anglican Church in Redcliff and the Whitecourt/Woodlands Meteorite Impact Crater.

Canora Railway Station News:

The society received a letter recently providing an update on the activities of the fine folks who operate the Canadian Northern Railway Station Museum in Canora, Saskatchewan. They thanked our society for the support that we provide in covering the costs of on-going liability insurance for the operation of the heritage 1904 station each year.

Joy Stusek of the committee writes that the Canora group has recently applied for a grant to develop a storage area for their various displays at the station. They now have developed a large collection of local pioneer artifacts, including a long-distance switchboard originally used in the Canora telephone office. They conducted several events in 2008 including an open house and a hot dog sale during Communities in Bloom week. They also held a well-attended Christmas decoration sale.

The group is looking forward to the proposed re-building of Fort Livingston and Fort Pelly in the area (founded by the explorer Henry

Kelsey in the 18th century and later capital of the North-West Territories 1876-77). This historic site will no doubt draw additional visitors to the Canora region—and will provide an opportunity for the station to be showcased to the public.

We are working on getting events onto websites and into any printed media we can. I have had the good fortune to attend the Boomtown Train Conference held in Camrose in February. Collaboration is becoming more and more prominent in the tourism industry. Some of the most interesting things I heard are that tourists want "purposeful travel"; tourists seek local dining cuisine (ingredients being grown or produced in the neighbourhood or purchased at the local farmers' market). A huge percentage of Alberta tourists are from Alberta. Because of this, much of the upcoming promotional efforts are staying in-province. With this in mind, it would be very beneficial for example to produce a brochure (and have it available electronically) showing the "Railway Stations of the Boomtown Trail," collaborating with Alberta Tourism, the Boomtown Train organization and the many Stations along the route. Equally, and something Glenys and I are working on is a one-day or two-day travel map to gardens in the area. At each stop, when the travel map is produced the tourist would receive a small envelope of seeds produced at

that garden. Each would give purposeful travel and appeal to a variety of interests.

The Camrose Station was successful in getting the AMA \$25,000 operational grant! With this we will be hiring a contract collections management coordinator, and as well there is some funding for me to attend workshop and courses. We also were awarded two AMA bursaries for me to attend AMA Museum Management Courses. The first one I will be able to take is on Research, February 27 and 28 in Hinton. We also want to thank the Battle River Community Foundation for the \$1500 grant to continue the security system project. I am also helping Glenys by taking on the tasks of attending some CREAM and Founders Day meetings.

Our Valentine's Day Supper was very successful again! There were so many people who helped with hostessing, food prep, baking, shopping, cleaning both prior to the event, during and after, and of course the amazing decorating! Thanks to Ted and Carol Rawson, Carol and Murray Roy, Dorothy Lysons, Robbie O'Riordan, Cheryl and Norm Prestage, Bruce and Glenys Smith, Ashleigh Dickson, Rebecca Bridger and Janine Carroll.
